Oranges Are Not Only A Fruit

While flicking through the hundreds of channels on SKY one recent midweek afternoon in an effort to find something worth watching I stopped at ITV4. The reason being that I had stumbled on them showing a repeat of the Big Match, this one being Manchester City 2-3 Chelsea from January 1979 in the old Division One (ask your Dad). The game played with a hearty covering of snow on the pitch while an extremely, were they really THAT orange, bright ball was punted around the park.

What was as intriguing as anything else was seeing the advertising hoardings around the side of the playing surface, along with the fact that even at the top level there were still big spaces between adverts, how times change. For the World Cup 1970 watchers they may have been more transfixed and traumatised though by the sight of a grey haired Peter Bonetti keeping goal for Chelsea, The Cat actually being 37 years of age by 1979.

Some of the companies advertising at Maine Road make your mind wander back to the days when fewer high street names seemed to be closing down than at the moment. Visionhire though being one who were eventually taken over by Granada, who then merged with Radio Rentals, the old VHS vs Betamax wars in the late 1970s when video recorders hit the mass market keeping Visionhire busy in that era.

I was surprised to see a big advert for Johnstone's Paints behind one goal as I wasn't aware that they had been involved in football sponsorship for so long, CIS Insurance being another company still backing the national game. For the XL Cheese fans there was a hoarding for Burton's crisps as well as another one on the food side being Jaffa Oranges and Grapefruits, don't see many of those advertised now.

A few other things to note from the game being the use of only one substitute plus I was asking the television why it wasn't a free-kick the first time Joe Corrigan picked the ball up from a back pass. The last thing I noticed being the old style scoreboard where you matched up the letters in the programme to the scoreboard to work out the half-time results. I'm not old enough, or I just can't remember when the old Brunton Park one was taken down, perhaps you can?

There are also plenty of these kinds of games being shown on ESPN Classic every day as well, with an ever extending library of matches to show now that we live in an era where there are around ten or so live television fixtures every week. We were actually on it ourselves a good while ago when they repeated a 1985 Match of the Day. The Blues surprising commentator John Motson by winning 3-1 at Maine Road in the old Division Two thanks to a Malcolm Poskett brace and a solitary Ian Bishop strike.

Watching football on television was a rare treat then though, unlike today where you are (too much) spoilt for choice. I remember living in Skipton as a teenager I was able to get Granada on the black and white portable television upstairs, rather than the Yorkshire TV we had downstairs. Granada at the time showing more games on a Sunday afternoon than Yorkshire used to, I think it was Martin Tyler and Clive Tyldesley that used to be the match commentators then.

Perhaps that is where Granada should have called it a day though considering the ITV Digital collapse in 2002. Joint owners with Carlton, the two having already sunk £800m into the loss making venture before it went into administration. Numerous Football League clubs, some of whom had, perhaps unwisely, already spent a lot of the money they were due to receive, from ITV Digital's crazy £315 million three-year deal to screen Nationwide League and Worthington Cup matches.

Gillingham in particular having put all their eggs in one basket on the contract. The club at the time rebuilding their Priestfield Stadium with projected money to come from ITV Digital and NTL, only for the media companies to collapse and force the Gills to finish the project by borrowing. Chairman Paul Scally eventually selling the stadium to himself in 2007 in an effort to clear to a holding company £9.8 million of the club's mammoth £13.3 million debt.

Whether or not there will be a television channel on the go showing Gillingham or Carlisle games in 30 years time remains to be seen, but they always make for an interesting watch and a good trip down memory lane. You see a few current managers in their playing days too, so perhaps Greg Abbott will be cutting up videotapes as we speak.

A Season in Brief 1977 - 78

The 1977-78 campaign saw Carlisle finish almost exactly where they did in 2010-11, in 13th place in the third tier of English football, nine points off the three promotion places and 11 points ahead of the four relegation spots, United ending up with 47 points, which would equate to 61 points under the current three points for a win system. The Cumbrians winning 14, drawing 19 and losing 13 of their 46 league games, drawing more matches away from home than they lost at ten to nine and also ending up with a level goal difference on the back of 59 goals both scored and conceded.

It took until the fourth game of the season for Carlisle, relegated from Division Two in 1976-77, to pick up their first league win, although it was at least at home to Preston with a 3-1 victory. Those two points coming a couple of weeks after United had exited the League Cup in a first round replay, the two legged tie having finished 3-3 on aggregate, with Huddersfield then winning 2-1 at Leeds Road in the third game to decide the winner. The Terriers themselves however going out at the next stage when they lost 2-0 at home to Coventry.

That win against North End was a bright light for the Blues in the first two months of the season though as they had dropped down to 23rd in the table by Bonfire Night after earning just three wins and six draws in their opening sixteen games. The draws then started coming even more regularly for Carlisle however, 11 in 20 matches and six in a row through mid-February to mid-March, that run also including seven wins and only two defeats as United managed to lift themselves up to 12th in the table as a finish in the top ten began to look likely. A draw and three losses in the next four games killed off any hopes of that though, but Carlisle at least ended the season pretty well with four wins from their last seven matches to finish in that 13th spot.

Aside from the league and the already covered League Cup United made it to the third stage and a big tie in the FA Cup after winning 2-0 and then 3-1 in respective first and second round home ties against Stafford Rangers and Chester City. Next up, for the only time in our history, was a game against Manchester United and a 1-1 draw at home to the Red Devils, Ian McDonald the Blues goalscorer in front of an estimated 25,500 supporters. The dream was over in the replay though as 54,156 fans inside Old Trafford saw Manchester United win 4-2 on the back of a 2-0 half-time lead, the Carlisle goalscorers that Wednesday evening being Mick Tait and Billy Rafferty.

Personnel-wise at Brunton Park that season Billy Rafferty was top scorer for the Cumbrians with 18 goals, just 11 of them coming in the league while Raff saved seven for the cups, Mick Tait following with 11 goals overall and Phil Bonnyman taking the bronze medal with eight goals. Mike McCartney was the only league ever present for United, although George McVitie did run him close after missing just one game, with Bobby Parker then in third on 44 starts.

In all matches preceding the Semi-Finals, the Visiting Club shall have the right to claim up to 15% of all accommodation for which tickets are issued providing these tickets are in a fully segregated area.

Net gate receipts shall be divided as follows:

- (i) In matches prior to the Third Round of the Competition Proper (other than replayed matches in the Competition Proper), the net gate receipts of each match shall be divided equally between the competing Clubs.
- (ii) In replayed matches in the Competition Proper prior to the Third Round, 5% of the net gate receipts shall be remitted to The Association and the balance shall be divided equally between the competing Clubs.
- (iii) In matches played in the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Rounds of the Competition Proper, the net gate receipts of each match shall be divided as follows:
45% to each Club competing in the match.
10% to the Pool.

- (iv) In replayed matches in the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Rounds of the Competition Proper the net gate receipts of each match shall be divided as follows:

5% to The Association.
42.5% to each Club.
10% to the Pool.

"The Pool" shall be a fund held by The Association which shall be divided at the completion of the Competition between the FA Premier League and the Football League for onward distribution to the Clubs in the FA Premier League and the Football League which participated in the Competition. The 5% payment to The Association for replayed matches in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Rounds of the Competition Proper shall be divided at the completion of the Competition amongst all the Clubs outside the FA Premier League and The Football League playing in the First Round of the Competition Proper.

In matches played in the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Rounds of the Competition Proper involving Clubs outside the FA Premier League or The Football League, the net gate receipts of each match shall be divided as follows:

50% to Clubs outside The FA Premier League or The Football League.
40% to FA Premier League or Football League Clubs.
10% to the Pool (save where both Clubs are outside the FA Premier League or the Football League).

In replayed matches in the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Rounds of the Competition Proper involving Clubs outside the FA Premier League or The Football League, the net gate receipts of each match shall be divided as follows:

47.5% to Clubs outside The FA Premier League or The Football League.
37.5% to FA Premier League or Football League Clubs.
10% to the Pool (save where both Clubs are outside The FA Premier League or The Football League).
5% to The Association.

In the Semi-Finals the remainder of the net gate receipts (less any payments to the staging venue) of both matches shall be combined and divided as follows:

32.5% to The Association.
58.5% to be divided equally between the four Clubs.
9% to the Pool.

In the Final, the remainder of the net gate receipts (less any payment to the staging venue) shall be divided as follows:

90% to The Association
10% to the Pool.

Let's hope that after you've just memorised all that we don't get knocked out in the first round!!

Interview with Paul Thirlwell

CUFC Away Travel have sponsored three players this season, Paul Thirlwell, Tom Taiwo and Jon-Paul McGovern. Here we caught up with Captain Paul Thirlwell, and asked him a little about himself and how important the fans were at away games.



What has been your favourite game as a Carlisle player?

Well I think it has to be the obvious one, last season's Cup Final. It was brilliant to play in the first one and be a part of it but we felt we had something to put right last season, and we did. It was a brilliant day for all of us.

Your favourite goal scored for United?

That would have to be the one against Millwall on the last day of the season. It was such an important game, one we needed to win. Kav still says his goal was better, but I'm not so sure. They were two great goals on the day and they meant a lot to everyone.

The first goal you scored for United was away at Swindon Town. You ran the full width of the pitch to celebrate with the fans after you scored, tell us about that?

I didn't know what to do to be honest, it's not something I think about beforehand. It was just great to score and it was late on in the match, so I just ran. It just seemed the natural thing to do, to share it with the fans.

At Colchester you again scored late on and swallow-dived in front of the fans to celebrate

Yes that was a good night. It was a good game. In the second half we bossed the game completely and it would have been a bit of a crime if we hadn't got a result. It's always great to score but when you get one so late, it makes it a bit special and I just had to come over and celebrate.

When it's an away game to you find out where the Carlisle fans are in the ground before the match?

Yes, I think we do. There are always some of the lads who have friends and family who have travelled to the game. It's nice to pick them out and give them a little wave before the game. Once the match starts, it's usually pretty obvious where the Carlisle fans are, we usually hear them!

At Rochdale last season, after Matty Robson scored, you pointed to him to go to the fans to celebrate, is it something you think is important?

I think it's good for everyone. With that one, it was a great free kick from Matty. Some people won't realise that Matty puts a lot of work in practising them. They don't all come off but he's getting more and more consistent. It was just nice to see him catch one like that in a game, and when he does catch one like that, it's impossible for the keeper to save. I just thought it would be nice if he ran over to the fans and milked the moment a bit. He won't get too many goals as good as that, and from the roar from our fans they definitely enjoyed it. I think the fans appreciate what we are trying to do and when it all comes together like it did at Rochdale, they played their part in what was a really good game. When you get those 2-3s and 3-4s and you come out on the winning side, it's great for everyone and the fans definitely play their part. I know we want clean sheets, I'm sure the manager would say that, but it is nice for everyone to get on the right side of a high scoring game now and again.

Looking ahead to this season, as a fan I'm looking forward to less travelling with more Northern teams in the division. Do the players feel the same?

Yes, definitely. The promotions and relegations at the end of last season has made a difference to the miles we travel. Hopefully it will benefit us, because we do travel a lot but we never used that as an excuse, so probably we can't say that it will. We have it in our heads we have to travel regardless, and the fans do it without complaint, so that's how it is.

Wherever Carlisle are playing, our fans travel and support the team, is that important to the players?

It's very important, especially if we get a foothold in the game or if we're struggling a bit. If we hear our fans getting behind us, it's great, and it spurs us on. It's just human nature if you hear the fans supporting you, it gives you a lift. Wherever we go we seem to get a good turn out. I know a lot of Carlisle fans travel from Carlisle to most if not all the games, and wherever we play there seems to be branches of the supporters. They always come out in force and give us the support we look for.

What can we do as fans to help the players in the match?

What you do really. Make as much noise as you can. I know we can't always give you something to cheer about, but I do know for a fact that there are a great bunch of lads here. The gaffer has got a great squad together in terms of them all giving 100% effort. There will be some bad days, we aren't going to win every match but we will put the effort in and I know the fans will be right behind us.

On the flip side, do you understand the frustration the fans sometime show at the final whistle?

Absolutely, we as players, feel just the same frustration when it hasn't gone well. No one wants to be involved in a bad performance, it hurts everyone, whether player or fan. We have to be realistic and we aren't going to win every game but I think, as a squad, we have learned to bounce back from defeats and not let it get us down. When you play in this League, games come thick and fast and you don't have time to dwell on defeats and we tend to pick ourselves up and get on with it.

Have you any personal goals this season?

Just to be part of this team and stay in the team. It's a good squad and everyone wants to get into that starting eleven, that has to be the short term aim and once you achieve that you want to stay there and you want to make the season more successful than last.

A third appearance at Wembley?

That would be nice, no one expected us to do the double, so a treble would be nice. Its like all the competitions, we'll go into it wanting to do the best we can and see where that takes us.



DCMS Football Governance Review Update

The Select Committee for the Department of Culture, Media and Sport have released their report and recommendations around a number of issues affecting football. The fallout from the report has already begun; with Football Association shareholders approving a proposal that will see an additional pair of independent, non-executive directors join the board. The proposal was passed with 97% of the votes, and will hopefully be the first of a number of key structural reforms.

Supporters Direct has gone through the DCMS report with a fine toothcomb, and is developing its response - much of which can be drawn from our four briefing papers published in 2011. We hope the outcome of the review can help the Coalition achieve its pledge to "encourage the co-operative ownership of football clubs by their supporters"; and also address the governance and regulatory issues prevalent across the game.

Through our travel newsletter we will share the Supporters Direct response and key actions with you in future newsletters.

Developing Public Policy to Encourage Supporter Community Ownership in Football

"It is difficult to think of another social or cultural sector that has as wide a reach, as comprehensive coverage of the nation, as deep historical roots or as big a potential to deliver social value as football."

Published in May 2011, this paper takes the promise made in the coalition's Programme for Government - to '...encourage the reform of football governance rules to support the co-operative ownership of football clubs by supporters' - as its starting point.

There is a direct relationship between the stated objectives of the coalition Government and the aims of Supporters Direct. This paper offers some practical means by which Government policy can be implemented. Issues covered include: Supporters, Community and Local Social Value; existing Company Law; Community Asset legislation; UK Sports Law; the Localism Bill; and methods of financing supporter community ownership.

Developing Football Regulation to Encourage Supporter Community Ownership in Football

"It's all very well football legislating to punish failure but they are not regulating to prevent it."

Also published in May 2011, this paper focuses on the changes needed in the regulation of football in England, to foster the growth of supporter community ownership. It also outlines the role supporter ownership and involvement can play in strengthening the governance of football and its individual clubs. Supporter community ownership brings greater accountability, reduces short-termism and aligns the interests of the club and its supporters.

Unfortunately, regulatory reform to date has been marginal, dealing with the symptoms of deep-seated problems in English football, rather than tackling their cause: the unsustainable financial state of many clubs and the failure to align the interests of clubs and their supporters and other stakeholders. Supporters Direct believe these can only be addressed by thorough-going structural reform.

Financing Supporter Community Ownership

This paper provides information and guidance on the different forms of fund raising available to supporters' trusts. Supporters Direct believes that the best way for supporters to have a meaningful role in the running of their clubs and to achieve the best possible social and community impact of clubs is through supporter community ownership based on the democratic supporters' trust model.

However, achieving the ownership of football clubs always requires trusts to be able to finance that ownership. One of the major obstacles to extending current supporter community ownership - whether for wholly owned, majority or minority ownership - is the ability of trusts to raise capital finance. An additional difficulty is the huge variety of circumstances in which opportunities for developing ownership through collectively and democratically held shareholdings occur. For those supporters' trusts that do have an ownership stake in their clubs, there are additional capital requirements, such as the development of new facilities. This briefing paper examines the relevant issues, and outlines how supporters' trusts can finance supporter community ownership.

Business Advantages of Supporter Community Ownership in Football

This paper is based on the practical experience of those who run supporter community owned clubs and supporters of those clubs; and provides both qualitative and quantitative evidence as well as case study material, on the business advantages that supporter community ownership of football clubs can bring. The purpose of the report

is to inform owners of clubs and local partners such as local authorities, as well as the game's administrators, about how supporter community ownership can contribute to the sustainability and prosperity of football clubs. It will also provide evidence, precedence and arguments for supporters' trusts in their work to achieve partial or full ownership of their clubs and share good practice.

This work gathers together knowledge developed from the extensive experience of Supporters Direct working in this field as well as from previously commissioned research undertaken by Supporters Direct (The Social and Community Value of Football).

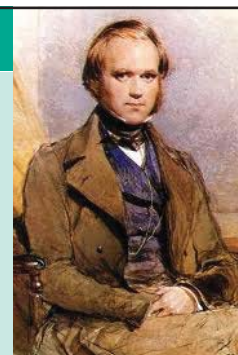
